



The appointment of the current Zambian Ambassador to the United States of America was greeted with great cheer and applause in Zambia. The President of the Republic of Zambia and the Ambassador received many compliments and congratulations.

One afternoon at the Ambassador's residence. Mr. Richard Schubert. Mrs. Virginia Schubert, Mr. Rick Little, Mrs. Elaine Little, Ms. Nawina Nyirenda and Dr. Inonge Mbikusita-Lewanika met. The conclusion was to establish 'Friends of Zambia' (FOZ).

Friends of Zambia was established and incorporated as a 501c(3) in the State of Virginia, facilitated and sponsored by Richard and Virginia Schubert and Rick and Elaine Little. These friends recruited their friends to join FOZ. Friends enlisted friends and so the FOZ increased.

The friends read everything they could find on Zambia. Zambia was in their heart. The Embassy of the Republic of Zambia gave the FOZ as many materials and information on Zambia as they could.

Then the FOZ decided to crown all the information and knowledge on Zambia that they had acquired with an on the spot visit to Zambia.

The Ambassador communicated the plan of the FOZ to visit Zambia. The Zambian leadership was happy with the idea and suggested an official launching of FOZ in Zambia.

Minister of Tourism visits U.S. to launch "Zambia... the Real Africa"

In April 2005, the Honorable Patrick Kalifungwa, Minister of Tourism, Environment & Natural Resources visited the United States to launch **"Zambia...the Real Africa"** the 2005 tourism campaign. At a reception hosted by the Zambian Ambassador to the U.S., H.E. Dr. Inonge Mbikusita-Lewanika, the Minister greeted guests, introduced members of his delegation and formally launched the campaign.

Ms. Charity Chanda Lumpa, Managing Director of the Zambian National Tourist Board, welcomed those attending and presented the campaign.

The campaign highlights Zambia and many events scheduled for 2005 including the Livingstone Centenary Celebrations. The presentation gave a broad overview of Zambia including: Zambia's superior location in the heart of southern Africa; its peaceful separation from Great Britain in 1964; its peaceful relations internally and with its eight neighbors for more than 40 years; and its low population of 10 million culturally diverse peoples speaking 73 tribal dialects with English as the primary language.

Zambia is shaped like a butterfly with major tourist destinations including Victoria Falls and the Zambezi River. Livingstone, Zambia's tourism capital, and Lusaka, the national capital, are major population centers. Nineteen well known National Parks include Kafue and North and South Luangwa which has the largest concentration of game in Africa and where walking safaris were pioneered.

The goal of the 2005 campaign is to increase tourism from the U.S. by 30% in the next five years.



The launching of Friends of Zambia (FOZ)

Twenty-two Members of Friends of Zambia traveled to Zambia in March 2004. They were mostly from the United States of America: Virginia, Maryland, Illinois, New York and California. Two (2) were from the United Kingdom.

The highlight of the visit was the launching of FOZ by the Government of the Republic of Zambia. The President of Zambia, His Excellency Levy P. Mwanawasa, SC and the First Lady, Mrs. Maureen K. Mwanawasa, hosted the FOZ at a luncheon at the State House of Zambia. The Hon. Patrick Kafumukache, Minister of Labour and Social Security officially launched FOZ in Lusaka, the capital of Zambia.

The FOZ visited Lusaka, and the Central, Southern and Western Provinces of Zambia. In Livingstone, they experienced the mighty MUSI-O-TUNYA (Victoria Falls) when the water was at its fullest, as it was the rainy season. Another highlight was the Boat Cruise on the great Zambezi River, one of the biggest rivers in the Continent of Africa. The FOZ also visited Senior



Chief Mukuni of the Toka Leya people as well as his Royal Palace. FOZ went through the Southern Province by road from Lusaka to Livingstone and back. They stopped at the Choma Museum where they were again treated to traditional crafts. They met a cross section of Zambian government officials, traditional and community leaders, men, women, youth and children.

The FOZ program visit exposed them to both rural and urban areas. They visited community projects; House of Moses (a rescue home for abandoned infants and orphans), Kabwata Orphanage, and Chilanga HIV/AIDS Hospice. The visit also took FOZ to the oldest national school for girls, Chipembi, two and half hours from Lusaka in Central Province. They had a delicious lunch at the Protea Hotel where they also viewed many animals. The Protea Hotel is co-owned with some Zambian locals. In Mongu, the FOZ paid courtesy calls on the Traditional Leaders. They visited the Kasholwasholwa Women's Resource Centre, a community initiative to create space for women. They had another glimpse of the Zambezi River in Senanga, Western Province of Zambia, where they were hosted to a lunch, which was a good match to the Six Star Hotels of Lusaka. The road from Mongu which in the past took fortyfive minutes took almost two hours due to damaged parts of the road.

Throughout their visit, the FOZ were received with joy, cheer and admiration for taking time to visit Zambia and the Zambian people. They were feasted and welcomed with singing, drumming and dancing. The FOZ visit was well covered by the Zambian press, radio, television and the print-media. FOZ reciprocated the welcome with gifts and souvenirs to Zambians. FOZ has made a great impression in Zambia and some bonding has occurred.

Upon their return FOZ members have adopted various projects which they are supporting. Among these are the Sefula School for the Blind and the Kasholwasholwa Women's Resource Centre. Other members are in personal contact with individual Zambians. One young Zambian has been sponsored for an MBA degree through these friendships. FOZ is currently working on more partnerships and support for Zambia.

One of the Friends of Zambia has supported work in Zambia through the African Development Foundation (ADF). ADF commenced work in Zambia in late 2003. They are supporting Out Grower farming sectors in the Copperbelt and Central Provinces. They have embarked on supporting two coffee projects in the Northern Province and beekeeping and honey products in North-Western Province.

In September 2004 the FOZ hosted a reception in Washington, D.C. in honour of His Excellency Levy P. Mwanawasa, SC, the President of the Republic of Zambia and the First Lady. It was superbly organized and well attended. The President, his delegation and staff of the Zambian Embassy greatly appreciated this kind gesture.

Follow-up

One of the follow-ups to the FOZ March visit was the facilitation of FOZ investors and business people to visit Zambia. This occurred in November 2004 when the FOZ second trip to Zambia was made. The group was comprised of 28 people from the business, corporate and philanthropic sectors. They followed the same program but started off in Livingstone. The group enjoyed the Falls and participated in related adventures such as bungee jumping. They went on Safaris in both Livingstone and Botswana. The group had a business meeting with the President and some Cabinet Ministers. The second FOZ group also had an opportunity to meet a cross section of Zambians and visited both urban and rural projects. They came face to face with HIV/AIDS and its effects at the University Teaching Hospital, Chilanga Hospice and others.

The visit ended with some commitments to business partnerships, investment and collaborative work to strengthen the Zambian economy.

Future

The Friends of Zambia plan to make two visits to Zambia each year, covering the various provinces. The goal of Friends of Zambia is to make friends in different countries and continents.

MWARAWASA Reception

In September 2004 the Friends of Zambia hosted a reception in Washington, D.C. in honor of His Excellency Levy P. Mwanawasa, SC, the President of the Republic of Zambia and the First Lady. The reception, attended by the President's delegation, Embassy staff and many friends of Board members of FOZ, was held at the Metropolitan Club. Virginia Austin Schubert, Chairman of the Friends of Zambia Board of Directors, welcomed His Excellency to the United States and outlined highlights of the FOZ trip to Zambia the preceding March. She recalled the warm hospitality that was extended by His Excellency and the First Lady to those on the trip and anticipated the next FOZ trip scheduled for November.

His Excellency graciously accepted the hospitality of the "Friends," and told the group about challenges in Zambia on which his administration is focused. He welcomed the involvement of the Friends of Zambia and invited those assembled to visit Zambia.

BEYOND THE ORDINARY: Journey to Zambia, November 2004

What would you do with eight days? Eight days to change your life, to alter your perspective. Eight days to jump-start making a difference in the world.

In November 2004, a group of 28 leaders in business and philanthropy from the U.S. and the U.K. came together for one intense, impacting week in Zambia. They traveled to remote villages, met with top government and business leaders, spoke with young entrepreneurs, visited HIV/AIDS clinics and orphanages, schools, and "programs that work" all to learn about the challenges and the opportunities in Zambia. Our hope was that those on the trip would come away—in eight days with a deep appreciation of the challenges and the incredible untapped potential opportunities in the country.

From spontaneously helping to deliver a baby in an underprivileged-area health clinic, to swimming in a natural pool at the very edge of Victoria Falls, to playing soccer and hanging out with young people in the province of Mongu, the participants on the November trip to Zambia experienced the country in a unique and personal way.
